# Club, Organization, and Classroom Happenings 

## Cinco de Mayo Celebrations at Sanborn <br> By: Sarah Bufano

On Friday, May 5th, Sra. Mercedes' room was the place to be! The Cinco de Mayo celebrations began when her Spanish 4 SNHU class learned how to make guacamole with Ms. Mainz. Sra. Mercedes' friend, Sra. Carnerio, later showed the class how to warm tortillas and even brought in some queso fresco to share with the class. Student's in Spanish 4 SNHU had a blast learning how to cook and enjoying popular foods from Spanish speaking countries. The party didn't end there! During FLT 1, members of the Spanish Honor Society and Spanish Club hosted a Cinco de Mayo fiesta! Many students brought in food and decorations, with some even going to FLT the day before to set up decorations! Sra. Carneiro was the guest of honor. There were cookies, cake, rice, chicken, and even enchiladas (provided with a cooking demonstration for the period 4 class). No one left the party hungry! After enjoying the food, party-goers learned how to dance and play Spanish party games.
 There were, of course, proper fiesta hats provided by Sra. Mercedes. All of this was to celebrate Cinco de Mayo, which in English translates directly to May 5th. Many think that this is Mexico's independence day, similar to the American 4th of July, but that is not true. On May 5th, 1862, French troops invaded Puebla, Mexico. Mexican soldiers were outnumbered with a 1-4 (Mexican-French) ratio. France sent their soldiers to invade with high tech (at the time) weapons and resources. The residents of Puebla did not have fancy weaponry. They were forced to fight with machetes and other close-range weapons. Though the Mexican troupes, led by General Ignacio Zaragoza, were outnumbered and had little resources, they were able to defeat the French troupes! Considering the fact that Mexico lost most of their later battles, it may seem odd that May 5th is celebrated. The reason for this is because the victory at Puebla inspired Mexican troops to continue their fight for freedom.
Shockingly, Cinco de Mayo is more commonly celebrated in the cities of the United States than in Mexico! As Sra. Mercedes' Spanish 4 SNHU class learned, most people enjoying Cinco de Mayo celebrations in the United States couldn't describe the holiday's relation to United States History. As it turns out, Americans celebrate Cinco de Mayo because it commemorates the Chicano movement, which began in New Mexico and spread throughout the country. After the Mexican-American war ended in 1848, Mexicans who chose to stay in the United States were promised the right to land, property, and continuation of their culture. In most cases, these people felt as though they were living as second class citizens. Rights promised to them were not upheld. This is when the Chicano movement began. Instead of trying to blend in with the current United States residents, they decided to embrace their culture and background. Activist leaders pushed for change in labor rights, education reform, and land reclamation for Mexican-American citizens. By adopting the name "Chicano", they took charge of a previously racial slur used against them. After movement activists felt as though they completed their duties to protect fellow Mexican-American citizens and generations to come, they wanted an event to

commemorate their bravery. Since the battle at Puebla in Puebla, Mexico sparked inspiration for Mexican citizens to fight for independence, members of the Chicano movement felt as though their leadership ignited a new kind of individuality for Mexican-American citizens post-war. Thus, Cinco de Mayo and the Chicano movement had similar morals. Today, United States citizens join in celebrating the bravery of all advocates, especially those who stand up for the importance of independence and equal rights for all.
