ApplyNH is Coming to Sanborn:

On November 14th, all Seniors will have an opportunity to apply to all NH Colleges and Universities for free! Students should plan to have their essay and common application completed and ready to submit. More information will be coming soon. Encourage your seniors to sign up for College Labs with their counselors to help with these documents.

Free and Reduced Lunch Information:



The school district is facing a demographic change. Historically, participation in free and reduced meal prices has hovered between 14 and 16 percent. Our most recent year, participation has declined to 7 percent. We continue to have food insecurity for some of our students, which has a detrimental effect on student learning and achievement.

With the help of the School Board, we have identified two areas that can have a significant impact on resolving food insecurities, as follows:

- 1. The School Board approved a "Meal Assistance Program" that receives donated funds to be spent purchasing food for students who do not otherwise qualify for free and reduced meals. To date, the program has received \$1,240.
 - a. Donations can be accepted by mail at 51 Church Street, PO Box 429, Kingston, NH 03848.

- b. Students in need of meal assistance should speak with their school counselor or school nurse.
- 2. Families can apply for free and reduced meal prices. Applications can be obtained at the main office of each school or online by **CLICKING HERE**.
 - a. Qualified families will receive free or reduced meal prices, according to their household income.
 - b. The District will receive additional state aid for "adequate education" and federal grant funding for additional reading and math assistance.

An Autumnal Monday In The Medicine Woods

Mulvey's Applied Botany class visited Mt. Kearsarge Indian Museum in Warner, NH on Monday, October 16th. Inside, you enter the circle, and the marvelous Mimi takes you on a tour through the tribes of Native Americans across the country to learn about all of the different plants and plant parts they use for fibers for clothes and baskets and artwork, medicine, weapons, fishing, and even their homes.

What stuck out most to us was the trees used for canoes. White birch was used as it is water resistant and rodent resistant. White pine was burned out because it grew close to the water and they didn't have to move it far. They would sink these pine canoes in the winter to



protect them from the ice. Pine pitch was used to glue their canoes to protect from leaking.

It was also interesting to learn what they made baskets from and how they used every single part of the animals they harvested. They never wasted anything, even using corn husks for dolls and deer hooves and turtle shells for musical instruments. Native Americans were known for combining their artwork into their everyday items: the carved handles on their knives, the moose hair and porcupine quill embroidery on their clothing, the designs on their clay pots.



Out in the Medicine Woods, we learned about all the different trees and their uses. Black Walnuts smelled like "sprite" or "socks" depending on which student you ask. If these walnuts are crumbled and sprinkled into a stream or pond, it will momentarily paralyze the fish so that they can more easily be caught. The inner bark was used to treat smallpox. Walnuts can also be used to dye fibers or as a source of food.

Moosewood Maple - have you ever noticed this species in the woods? It has very soft leaves that could be used for natural toilet paper or maybe even bedding.

Sugar Maples are used to make maple syrup. It takes 40 gallons of sap to make 1 gallon of syrup. But how can you tell a Sugar Maple from a Red Maple? Check the leaves for "teeth". The Sugar Maple does not have teeth on the edges of its leaf like the Red Maple has, you can remember this because sugar rots out your teeth!

Staghorn Sumac can also be found on the edge of the forest. Native Americans used this for tea and medicine. It was also used as a source of red dye for fibers. It smelled like crapherries!

Jewelweed is another plant at the forest edge. We found out that the seed pods explode when you touch them, which was interesting and unique to be able to experience. Native Americans used it as a treatment for poison ivy and other skin ailments.

The next time you go into the woods, look for these species around you and try to understand how the people who lived here before us used the forest to survive.









Key Club wants to Help YOU:
