### Art

### Students will:

- Continue using the Elements of Art (line, color, shape, form, value, texture, and space)
- Continue using the Principles of Design (balance, proportion, pattern, movement, emphasis, unity, and variety)
- Apply art to different subject matter, such as math, science and history
- Be focusing on student creativity and individuality.
- Learn about a variety of artists and their techniques, Wil be able to explore these techniques with different media used within the Art classroom.
- Use crayons, oil pastels, colored pencils, watercolor paint, tempera paint cakes, tempera paint, clay, paper mache, paper clay and printmaking.
- Practice the Art criticism process.
- Increase art vocabulary and begin to express opinions about their own and others' artwork.

#### Music

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### Students will:

- Continue building literacy skills with all notes of the major scale on the treble clef
- Be introduced to the concept of bass clef and the grand staff
- Utilize ta/ti ti syllables to compose and perform quarter note and eighth note patterns on body percussion and hand drums
- Continue to develop their vocal skills by differentiating between singing in their head voice and chest voice
- Sing songs in strophic form (verse one, chorus, verse two, chorus...)
- Continue movement exploration with steady beat and body percussion as part of rhymes and songs, circle games and folk dances
- Apply literacy skills to Orff mallet percussion instruments
- Develop their mallet percussion technique (grip, rebound, tone) and hand drum technique
- Explore ukulele strumming technique and basic chords

### **Physical Education**

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### Students will:

- Continue to develop gross motor skills (running, walking, skipping, jumping, etc)
- Continue to develop sportsmanship, rules, and safety
- Learn a variety of techniques for how to apply gross motor and movement skills to gameplay
- Practice receiving constructive criticism from peers
- Increase PE vocabulary and begin to express opinions about the feedback process
- Begin to engage in competitive gameplay
- Be introduced to equipment and the proper techniques for using equipment safely
