Sports Awards - SRMS Winter Sports Awards will be Wednesday, March 13th in the auditorium at 5:00.



NHSAS Assessments - Per State law, all NH schools are required to assess students using the NH Statewide Assessment System (NHSAS) in the following areas: Mathematics, Reading, Science (8th gr. only) and Writing. Here is the schedule for these assessments: Writing - March 13th; Science (8th gr. only) - April 10th; Reading -May 8th; and Mathematics - May 15th. Each assessment takes approximately 2 hours and will be given first thing in the morning. Students who are absent on the day of an assessment will make it up on a later date. A Message From School Counseling

Students Respect Teachers Who They Feel Respect Them

This past Friday, students were offered the opportunity to anonymously share with their teachers and staff members just what it is that the adults in our building do to help make the students feel welcome, appreciated, and respected.

A snapshot of their feedback included things like:

- You show that you really listen to students.
- I know you respect us when you let us share our opinions.
- We love it when you play games with us.
- You remember all our names and things about us.

What these messages show us is how important small actions and words—such as thanking a student for their hard work, giving them space when they ask for it, learning a few words in their home language, or answering a question they were afraid to pose—all go a long way in communicating that we respect and care about them.

I am sure that the kids have all been asked to respect their teachers and other adults in their lives, but this helps to shine the light on the fact that when the kids feel respected, and welcomed, and that they are a part of the community, they respond in kind with the respect that some might have come to expect.

My advice as a mentor in the school to new teachers is this:

"Get to know your students as individuals from the start, and not just another group of students. You might find yourself among some very interesting kids, each with thoughts and personalities of their own.

You may also notice a change in your classroom atmosphere as less instances of student behavior get in the way of learning, and more kids are eager to share themselves with the group."

Students walk the equivalent of uphill both ways during a snowstorm as they are tasked with a full day of learning, facing changes to their social lives and circles, are grouped with twenty of their peers who all are experiencing their own challenges and successes internally.

By respecting how hard they work, how well they navigate their school and home time and leading with respect and empathy, we show that their efforts are observed, and to be rewarded.

Daniel J. Bakie School KINDERGARTEN REGISTRATION for Newton and Kingston, NH

If your child will be five years old by September 30, 2024, and you are a <u>resident of</u> <u>Kingston or Newton, NH</u>, you should consider registering your child for full-day kindergarten for the 2024-2025 school year. Please visit our school website at http://www.sau17.org/3/home and click the 2024-2025 registration link. Registration is done completely online. Documentation required to complete the registration process includes a current physical & immunization record and proof of residency documents. The Sanborn Regional School District has defined the following acceptable residency documents: a copy of a <u>current</u> utility bill (electric, cable, gas, oil) showing your name and address (no P.O. Boxes), <u>along with</u> either a signed lease, a notarized letter from Builder or Realtor, property tax bill, settlement document on a new home or a property deed. Registering early helps us plan appropriately. We ask that registrations be completed *no later than Wednesday, May 1st.*

New Hampshire State Law requires all children to have had immunizations for DPT, Polio, Mumps, Measles, German Measles, Chicken Pox, and Hepatitis B before school entry. They also require each child to have a complete medical examination within one year before entry into kindergarten.

Incoming parent orientation is scheduled on **Wednesday, April 10th from 3:20-4:20 p.m.** at the D.J. Bakie School (see below for specifics). This event is designed for parents/guardians and their students! This event is focused on visiting kindergarten classrooms, meeting the teachers, and seeing their classrooms. There will be an opportunity to meet our unified arts team and see other specific programs at a later date. The schedule is as follows:

Time: 3:20-3:50 If your Last Name begins with A-M (If you have older students or PreK students, please park at Swasey after pick-up and walk over. Please do NOT park in the lot here) 3:50-4:20 If your Last Name begins with N-Z

We are excited to have you share the opportunity to visit classrooms and speak with our staff!

All incoming kindergarten students are required to participate in a screening process. You must register your child so that they may participate in the screening. Screening dates will be announced at a later time.


Ryan's Message
